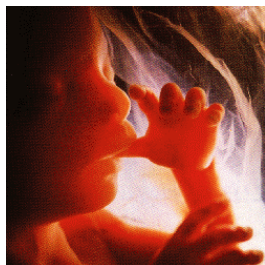


# July 20th Vote Yes to Protect all Persons in Georgia!

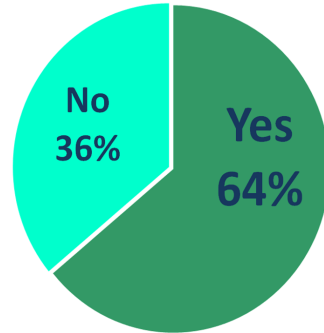

This ballot initiative will send a message to the Georgia legislature that the people want to vote on a Personhood Amendment in 2012.

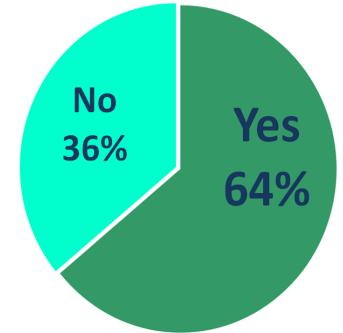
